Individual homework (essay, presentation)	40%	A specified time during the semester	 Problem essay and presentation of a chosen topic, based on the analysis and critical evaluation of relevant material. Assessment criteria: 1. Content (2 points): depth of analysis, elaboration, critical thinking, clear, consistent and logical argumentation. 2. Lexical expression and accuracy of speech (1 point): lexical diversity, fluency of speech, accuracy of lexical and grammar structures, pronunciation. 3. Delivery (1 point): visuals, persuasiveness and clarity of the presentation, contact with the audience (for the presentation); the structure and formal requirements, accuracy of writing (for the essay).

Assessment criteria: 1. Content (1 point): depth of analysis, elaboration, relevance to the task, clear, consistent and logical argumentation. 2. Lexical expression and accuracy of speech (0,5 point): lexical diversity, fluency of speech, accuracy of lexical and grammar structures, pronunciation. 3. Delivery (0,5 point): visuals, persuasiveness and clarity of the presentation, contact with the audience; the overall quality and integrity of the presentation as a groupwork.
