#### POLITICAL AND RADICAL ISLAM

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## **COURSE DESCRIPTION and REQUIREMENTS**

The course is aimed at providing skills to evaluate critically and analyse the political thought, movement, establishment of political and radical Islam.

The analysis will be held in the manner of challenging popular Western notions of Islam as a monolithic worldview. Therefore we will show diversity of Islamic political thought and it's representations: we will regard Sunni and Shia political thought, also extremist (fundamentalist) and liberal Islam will be distinguished, and variety of transnational and regional settings of Islamic movement and establishment will be observed.

## Learning outcomes of the course

- Ability to understand the historical and theological roots behind the political and radical action in Islam;
- Capability to recognize the diversity of Islamic political thought, movement and establishment;
- Awareness of the nature and function of political authority, legitimization, reasoning and principles in the Islamic politics and radical behaviour.

### Requirements of the course

- Qualitative participation at the class (10 %): at least one notice at the class;
- Media monitoring (oral & written; one time/semester; 10 %): at the beginning of each class a few students will be asked to present current political events in the Middle East that can be associated with or inspired by Islam. Also students will be required to be acquainted with the context of the events they present. Written media monitoring comment along with the link to the media article should be placed on the FB page of the course.
- Presentation of additional materials (oral; one time/semester; 10 %): students responsible for presentation are asked to contribute to the class, which means not to report the content of the read materials, but more to contribute to class discussion with valuable notices which attracted their attention in the text they read. Visual presentation is welcomed.
- Answer 2 question during the course (written; two times/semester (not specified when); 40%): at the end of one class (not specified which) students will be asked to answer a question, concerning the read materials for the class and materials presented by the lecturer.
- Final paper in a form of report on a radical organisation you choose (written; 30%).

Attendance: students are allowed to miss 2 classes. If more than 2 classes are missed, at the end of the course they will have an oral discussion with the teacher on the reading materials of the missed classes. Students missing more than 50% of the classes will not be assess.
